[Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System \(AHCCCS\)](#)

AHCCCS, the state's Medicaid Program, offers health insurance, medical programs and resources to serve Arizona residents who meet certain family income criteria and other requirements. All health plans cover the same services, but each may work with different doctors, pharmacies, hospitals and other providers. Health Plans differ, depending on where you live in Arizona. There are health plans in every county, so applicants may choose a health plan that serves the area where they live. When picking a plan:

- Find out which plan contracts with your doctor (you can call your doctor's office)
- Contact each health plan for more information (you can look up the providers on their websites or call their member services)

ASHLine

ASHLine, Arizona Smokers Helpline is a free telephone and web-based quit tobacco coaching service for all Arizonans. The program is made possible through a partnership between the Arizona Department of Health Services Bureau of Tobacco Education and Prevention and the Mel and Enid Zuckerman College of Public Health at the University of Arizona.

ASHLine services for clients include: quit tobacco coaching over the telephone, interactive quit planning at www.ashline.org, and medication assistance programs.

AHCCCS is now able to cover smoking cessation medications for up to twelve weeks.

Community Health Centers

Arizona currently has twenty-one Federally Funded Community Health Centers and two Federally Qualified Health Centers "Look-Alikes" in the state. These non-profit health centers, or CHCs, are in medically underserved areas - both rural and urban - throughout Arizona. They share a mission of making comprehensive primary care accessible to anyone regardless of insurance status. A sliding fee schedule considers the patient's family size and income. Services include preventive, primary, acute and chronic disease care; diagnostic laboratory and radiology services, pharmacy, case management and referral.

Keogh Health Connection

Keogh Health Connection outreach offices and hands on, bilingual assistance staff members are in community centers, hospitals and clinics, disability rehab facilities, family services organizations, schools and educational aid centers, food banks and more in over 30 locations in the Phoenix metro area.

Clients can learn about and apply for the right health care option for themselves and their families, right on the spot. The staff helps families understand and navigate the often-complicated process, requirements and choices that make up the Affordable Care Act Marketplace. Staff also help approximately 70% of their clients apply for SNAP (Formerly Food Stamps).

For those not qualified, Keogh staff members help direct them to community resources such as food banks, St. Vincent De Paul dining rooms and free medical and dental clinics, as well as Temporary Cash Assistance (TANF), and supportive services for the most vulnerable Arizona children and their families, helping them become stabilized and build a bridge back to self-sufficiency.

Open Airways

Contact your local American Lung Association chapter. A program for elementary school children ages 8-11. Participants meet in six 40-minute sessions during the school day, apart from their class. The curriculum incorporates an interactive teaching approach utilizing group discussion, stories, games and role-play.

Early care and education providers play a major role in the health and safety of children. A classroom or center with twenty children may include two or more children with asthma. It is essential that providers understand asthma and know how to provide the highest quality care for children with asthma. With proper care, most children with asthma can lead normal, active lives and can enter school with the same abilities as other children. This handbook was produced by the California Childcare Health Program and designed to cover the following topics:

The PACE Curriculum

The Pace program curriculum, developed by NHLBI, is intended for clinicians. It is delivered in two 2 1/2-hour interactive sessions, ideally spaced one week apart to give participants an opportunity to try out the concepts from the first session. Their experiences can then be discussed at the second session. The seminar works best when there are three to four instructors, including:

- Primary care provider
- Asthma specialist
- Health educator
